Phil shared a rare item of Lionel wartime production, a tailrace (A kind of ship's speedometer). I shared some things an that I picked up at the TCA National Convention, namely: two Fandor (Dorfan) 1 gauge passenger cars, a Forbes replica of an El Camino Real marker bell, a Wolverine Panama Pile Driver, and a mystery tinplate viaduct. At the September meeting Barry shared his collection of steam engines. He even fired one up! Jack shared a Marline Nuclear Reactor steam engine. Bill shared a mystery Japanese engine. 

Anyway, it was a great show as usual, and I'm looking forward to next year. It's scheduled, by the way, in the same place on November 7-9, 2003. The annual River City Meet has several purposes. The Meet promotes the toy train hobby to the public, it is a trading and social gathering for our members and other vendors, and the profit pays for the Sierra II Center rent for the following year. The 2002 Meet made a profit of \$2,146. We project the 2003 Sierra II rent to be approximately \$1,485 (\$135 x 11 months) so we made our goal.

General comments: The meet appeared to run very smoothly. No last-minute problems were noted. The covered table rule will be deleted for next year, it does not appear to serve any purpose. The trading hall was cluttered with litter and food plates requiring more cleanup than usual this year.

We did have a lot of vendors subletting tables and piggybacking on the table registrant's seller's permit. For 2003 we will change our table from to be similar to the Cal-Stewart Pasadena form and the TTOS San Joaquin Division Turlock form to allow for registration of the "casual seller".

Revenue: We increased table fees by \$5 per table. Door admissions were increased by \$1 to \$5 for single admission and \$9 for couples. An estimated 314 people paid admission. There was free admission after 2:00pm.

Expenses: Our expenses decreased by \$135 from last year.

Hall Rental: It appears the \$80 energy surcharge has been made a permanent part of the hall rental. The hall rental fee was increased by \$20 from last year.

Flyers :The Flyer category includes copy costs for store flyers, \$1 off postcards, and press releases. We cut back on the number of \$1-off postcards mailed. We collected 54 postcards at the door, which is typical.

Advertising: this includes paid classified ads in the BEE. This has not proved to be cost-effective.

Vendor Drawing: There did not seem to be any complaints concerning the reduced prize. A flat rate \$25 prize may be the best value. We only had one vendor leave early at approximately 1:30pm.

Layout Prizes: \$25 per layout or display seems practical and the recipients seem pleased. No complaints noted.

Door Prize: The three \$25 gift certificates appeared to be popular, easy to administer, and less expensive, especially compared to mailing a train set to a winner. 192 door prize forms were submitted.

Postage and Phone: We cut back on the number of mailings of table applications and postcards. The Lochers did table confirmations by phone, which saved confusion at the trading hall during setup.

Janitorial: The gratuity was increased by \$5 this year. The custodians had all the tables in place by the time we got to the hall at Friday 1pm. We did some minor rearrangement in which the custodians were very helpful. We felt the time saved was worth the increased gratuity.

Other: The "Other" category included a package of printer labels for name badges and vendor donuts.

New Feature: Workshops

As we have seen over the last few years, the social and interactive programs of our monthly meets have become quite popular. I believe they, along with our Officers' efforts, have raised the spirits of our Division. With this thought in mind, I am developing an idea to augment our club activities with an additional program consisting of several Workshops.

I have approached several members about conducting such Workshops. They reacted very positively and would be interested in presenting some 'heavy duty' subjects. In particular, Jerry Azzaro has offered to give a class, using an actual computer and monitor, showing us how to effectively buy and sell on eBay. Both Jack Hornor and Phil Fravesi would offer electrical and electronic symposiums. These would range from Phil explaining basic electricity as it applies to our layouts to Jack showing us how to understand, install and use the latest electronic control and audio systems. In time, there could be several more, including painting, restoration, and Hi-Rail scenery techniques.

I've discussed the above with our SVD Officers and they are unanimous in their support. All agreed the best time would be following our regular Sierra II Meets. After some discussion it was decided that the Workshops should be held off-premise. The current plan is for the hour-long Workshops to be held in the Clubhouse of my Mobile Home Park. Along with no rental charge, this would allow for advance setup of the room in the arrangement of the presenter's choice. It offers a secluded, quiet and manageable atmosphere, fewer time constraints and all amenities for attendees' comfort. The Park is located about fifteen minutes from Sierra II. I propose that 'classes' would start at noon, with coffee, beverages and perhaps light sandwiches served from 11:30 'til the first bell rings.' There are no charges planned but there may be a 'Koffee Kitty'

As stated, this is an ambitious program. Handled as outlined, it could be a notable T.T.O.S. Divisional project. Obviously the presenters would be putting a lot of thought and work into it. The Park is donating the facilities and I'll be happy to coordinate it. In speaking to Phil, Jack and Jerry their immediate concern is, will it be worth it? If only four or five want to learn about a particular topic, it would be easier just to invite them to the homes and tutor the few!

So, at this point, it is up to the membership. I know there are plenty of questions about schedules etc. but before we do any further planning, we must hear from you. We're not up to scheduling, enrollment or commitment yet. All that is being asked now is, if this is something you honestly would like to attend? There are no correct or incorrect answers. Invitation to Run Trains

This is an invitation to all TTOS division members to come and run trains with the Golden State Division on Saturday, February 8, 2003 between 10:30 and 5:00 PM. This is an informal event and the purpose is just to get together with other TTOS members and run trains.

We have our modular layouts set up permanently at a store space in the Silicon Valley WAVE (formerly Sunnyvale Town Center) Mall in Sunnyvale California about 10 miles north of San Jose in the San Francisco Bay Area. We have two modular O-Gauge layouts, each with 3 loops and one Standard Gauge Layout with 2 loops.

We open the mall to the public three times a month from January through October on the second and fourth Saturdays from 10:30 AM to 5:00 PM and on the second Wednesday each month from 6 to 8:30 PM. We run on a special schedule for the holidays in November and December.

The selected date of February 8, 2003 is the second Saturday in February and we will be open and running for the public when you come. After the running sessions, operators generally go out for dinner at one of the many nearby restaurants in Sunnyvale, and you would be invited for that as well.

Of course, all TTOS members are welcome to come run trains on our layouts anytime we are open. But we have selected this particular date with the hope of getting more people together at one time. Let me know if you want to come on any other date so I can verify that we are open. I realize it's a long way to come for most divisions just to run trains, but the invitation is open anyway. It might be fun. Hope to see you there.
