HELLOATE, A HECK OF A BRIDGE

As I have been telling folks for the longest time, there is just no end to what one can find on the Net. I was Rail-fanning the other eve and being in a very railroadacious mood, I clicked on an old favorite of mine, the Long Island R.R. (N.Y.). Scrolling its myriad menu, my neck hairs suddenly flared up. "Pond Junction" was an area I played and constantly got into trouble as a kid. This, however, is a long story and destined to be told in another publication. What's




probably more interesting to most is the photo tour offered on this site. Just before running through my childhood neighborhood, a connecting line (now called the N.Y.A.) crossed through the famed "Hellgate Bridge". This website has some tremendous photos of the real bridge, including rivetdetailed close-ups from below! Interestingly, aside from the curved, three-mile long deck girder sections approaching the massive concrete towers, Lionel's version is fairly accurate. The major

departure J.L.C.s designers fudged on was the towers' cathedral style openings. Lionel claimed it was their engineering feat to have their (single) mainline run at ground (floor) level. They did copy the arch style openings, but they are just kind of uselessly placed at mid-tower height. On the prototype the openings make sense, they are actually at track level. The lower potion of the span supports the weight of the busy four-track behemoth! Put another way, the tracks run through the center of the bridge, not on the bottom. Why the name? Hellgate crosses over the confluence of Long Island Sound and the East River. (N.Y.) The waters are treacherous! Cost? Greenberg's guide is rapidly catching up with the prototype's cost! Web site?



Recent Layout Visits



John points out one of the new attractions in them thar hills at the far corner of his huge layout




Mount Eister - the fanciful mountain rises to the ceiling - you can go inside and peek out through the tunnel portals!


Jack Ahearn is likely to pop up anywhere trains are running. Here, he pops up in the middle of Francis Eister's layout.

TTOS Executive Board Meeting Notes

Friday, August 2, 2002

Membership and Recruitment Efforts - TTOS now has 6248 members, down from 6543 this time last year. President Tom Lawler suggested providing a subsidy to each division for advertising to build local membership. Tom suggested that each of us needs to actively recruit new members. Several others voiced their opinions along the same lines, such as expanding services and providing materials to new members. There was a discussion of members' suggested modifications for the TTOS website. The web site should to be changed and updated regularly to attract potential new members, and to provide current information for existing members.

In addition, there was discussion of the on-going collaborative advertising campaign between TTOS and *Classic Toy Trains* magazine (CTT). CTT has designed and implemented a new TTOS monthly ad series based on TTOS member's photos and quotes. CTT staff did the layout work and graphics at no charge to TTOS. TTOS is also sponsoring a reduced cost, full-color, full-page ad in the CTT 15th Anniversary November issue.

Also, CTT has cooperated with TTOS as part of CTT's "World's Greatest Hobby" initiative. The result of this will be a fair amount of free publicity for the club. The TTOS website, and a vigorous national advertising campaign in hobby publications have the potential to significantly increase TTOS' membership and improve the club's long-range cash flow situation.

Bulletin Editor Arlen Hurt asked the division presidents and representatives present to encourage their local membership to send articles and photos to him for publication in *The Bulletin*. He also asked those present to submit any photos and news articles about local divisions running trains at children's hospitals, schools, malls, etc. New material is always needed.

The Operator of the year Award was renamed to the "Ward Kimball Operator of the Year" Award in honor of TTOS member Ward Kimball. Jack Hornor of SVD was named this years Operator of the Year.

Treasurer's Report – As of June 30, it appears that 2002 will be a "break-even" year, which will set the stage for a profitable 2003. The 2003 Denver convention should be quite popular and attract many members.

Convention Cars – The 2002 San Pedro, Los Angeles and Salt Lake boxcars have arrived at the shipper in Michigan. Members who ordered the 2002 SP,LA&SL convention cars can expect to receive their orders by the end of August. The 2003 convention cars will be Lionel O-Gauge and American Flyer S-Gauge Denver & Rio Grande tank cars. The cars will be in the striking "Grande Gold and Silver" paint scheme with the "Main Line Through the Rockies" logo. This car will be the first American Flyer tank car in the D&RGW road name.

National Board Meetings - Vice President Steve Latta reported that Board meetings via teleconferencing were almost as expensive as having the entire Board meet physically. The next board meeting will be at the Cal-Stewart Santa Clara Meet in February 2003.
