

The Grand opening of the **Thomas W. Sefton collection** was, as expected, a great success! About 4,500 visitors passed through the 3300 square foot maze of exhibit cases, life sized Lionel accessories and sound activated displays. The four track, thirtyish by fifteen foot layout looked spectacular! Along with reproduced MTH standard and 'O' gauge icons running gracefully around 300 feet of track, the original accessories were overwhelmed only by the beautifully scenic tri-level layout. The folks at Exhibit Works really came through with some spectacular effects. The overhead Layout spotlights are timed to go through a cycle of daylight to dusk to night time lighting effects. Meanwhile a




half of dozen accessories can be L.E.D. highlighted with the touch of a visitor's finger. For those who like to play engineer, all four operating trains on the layout, although on timers, can also be started with the touch of an interacting finger. And for those who could not get close enough to the twenty-eight inch low, 'tot friendly' *railroadacious* wonderland, the Standard Gauge Blue Comet offered video coverage of its trips through meadows, tunnels and bridges via a cab cam in its #400E Steam Locomotive. All that, and one could watch **Clyde Easterly** eat three ice cream cones!

A lighter observation would include **Phil Fravesi's** exhilarating and almost orgasmic reaction to one of the life sized Lionel accessories. Was it the #122 or #127 Passenger Stations? ...nooooo. Was it standing beneath a late colors, #155 Freight platform? .. noooooo...., sitting in the #76 Bellman Shack, or passing by a full-sized #076 warning sign? naaaaaw. But look at his eye-popped face and hear his ear splitting glee when he looks at the eight foot tall #57 orange 'Broadway Lamp' and you can hear the buzz saws and paint brushes getting to work in his home workshop! Why, it's almost as exciting as watching Clyde eating four ice cream cones!

### **Show and Tell**

The theme of our June meeting was TRAINS AND TOY TRAINS IN ART. Tom **MacConnell** shared a piece of fabric that had a pattern of trains. **Pete Keesling** brought in a small quilt with a locomotive embroidered on it. He also had a water-color of a train going through a peaceful countryside. We were not sure whether one of **John Leins** pictures was a sketch or a print. It was a picture of a train trestle. He also had an old Currier and Ives colored print of two 0-4-0 locomotives passing. **John DeHaan** displayed a print of a 1905 painting by Earnest Monteaux showing a race car crossing the tracks in front of an oncoming train. Monteaux created the art of speed lines. John McLeod showed a charcoal sketch of a train by Charles Mathios. **Jack Ahearn** shared copies of two paintings. One was a picture of an early transcontinental freight train. He thought that the picture over-glamorized the subject because two stagecoaches were being carried on a flatcar. I told him that I had seen a copy of that painting in the history room of the main office of the Wells Fargo Bank in San Francisco thirty-five years ago. He also had a copy of a Nevada Shortline train. I shared many items including: a copy of the program for Southern Pacific Day at the Panama Pacific Exposition in 1915, wartime and postwar advertisements, the "toy train collecting" postage stamp, a display of some of Ward Kimball's art works, a Southern Pacific GOLDEN PASS KEY, a thirty-two year old photograph of **Clyde Easterly**, and a sketch from the 2004 Orchard Supply Hardware calendar of the "Oakland Mole" (A picture that I remembered firsthand because I was there at the time).

The theme of our July Show & Tell was, RECENT FINDS: SCOTTISH RITE, TCA CONVENTION, EBAY, AND FLEA MARKETS. **Tom MacConnell** brought in a "Coffee Can Train" train from the 1930's. It was part of a sales campaign by Tasty Food Products. Each can came with the necessary parts to convert the can into either a locomotive or train car. He also had an original sign that advertised this promotion.

Clarence Hanks had a set of green 0 gauge passenger cars made by Williams. They were very similar to those made by Lionel, the only difference being the lettering. These cars were pulled by a pair of Alco 2023 locomotives that he purchased in pieces. Clarence also displayed a standard gauge Mickey Mouse train made by Pride Lines. The lithoed cars were very similar to cars of the 1935 Lionel Mickey Mouse Circus Train. Pride only made a few of these trains, as they could not secure the copyright from the Disney Corporation. Clarence found the train at Carter's Toy Shop in Gettysburg, PA.. It was only after he and his wife had left Gettysburg and were heading to Lancaster that they decided to purchase this train. They completed the transaction over a cell phone. The train had been delivered to his home a day or two before our meet.

**Bill Wilson** shared an Ets 0 gauge model of a Garret locomotive. These locomotives were very popular in Europe and Africa. They operated like our Mallets, basically two steam engines under one boiler. The only difference being that each set of cylinders and drive wheels opposed each other rather than being in line.

**Chuck Stone** sang the praises of the 50th annual TCA convention in Pittsburgh. He showed us a special convention plate, medal, and a huge 0 gauge hopper car. He also displayed a hundredth anniversary Lionel medallion that he had won. He showed a Lou Redmond pin, made in Lou's likeness, wearing his famous train suit. Chuck told us about the lives transition bell signal that he found in pristine condition.

**Dave Dunlap** also went to the Pittsburgh convention. He told us about the silent auction where they raised \$60,000. A very interesting 1 gauge 3240 lves locomotive was shared by **Clyde Easterly**. It was made between 1909 and 1912. This locomotive had a 15 volt motor and a transformer that stepped it down to 1 1/2 volts to operate the headlight. It seems that at that time they had no mini-bulbs that could take greater voltage. Clyde said that this locomotive is a good runner.

I presented a 1 gauge steam locomotive that I picked up on eBay. I think it was made by Schonner. I also had an early Marklin crossing, a small Marklin station, two Bing bell houses, and a Marklin 1 gauge baggage car. I also had a 1 gauge Karl Bub passenger train from the mid 1920's. It had a very rare electric American configuration (having a cow catcher and a bell) and three cars. The only problem was that the cars had no roofs. I also displayed a Karl Bub car from 1930. It was obvious that in those few years Bub had "thinned their product". The car was smaller and had less details, like opening doors, than the earlier cars.

We did not have an august meeting due to the TTOS Convention in Fresno. It was a great convention. We had a great tour of Yosemite, climaxed by a delicious dinner, a ride on the Sugar Pine Railway, and songs around a campfire. The layout tours were fantastic (I will be discussing with you some of the great things that I spotted in these collections). The dinner show, HOT MIKADO, was spicy and as good as any production that you could find in either Sacramento or San Francisco. The people in Fresno went out of their way to provide us with a great time. I would like to thank everybody involved, especially **Tami Jo** and **Ted Nix**.






































## RUN WITH THE BIG DOGS


