# **Layout Tours**

I have found that in the train clubs to which I belong there are two things that go together — food and toy trains. Therefore when you came to the Hornors' open house after the September 4 meeting, you found a mixture of both. As you came through the door, you were first greeted by a living room filled with operating trains, and if and when you got past the trains, the kitchen and patio were filled with people chopping and stirring and eating and drinking. The hostess seemed somewhat surprised to find that her open house had actually started, but thanks to everyone who chipped in to help, it turned out o.k. At least I guess it was o.k., because the food was practically all gone by the time I finished demonstrating how a confused old man can try to simultaneously operate seven trains with TMCC remote control. The operation went as well, or maybe better, than expected with only one or two crashes before the session ended. The 11' x 15' layout contains about 200 feet of Atlas track with six mostly-interconnected loops and an industrial siding. For the most part, I used Lionel TMCC both in the conventional and TMCC mode. Four of the eight engines that operated that day were not TMCC-equipped, showing that it is possible to operate almost everything by remote control these days. One of the newer projects is the Toonerville Trolley which operates atop a long bookcase and has turntables at the ends of the single track. As the trolley progresses, the Skipper

stops at the station and pauses to light the lamps along the route while calliope music plays in the background. I see in my refrigerator that we are laying in a new supply of Velveeta, so perhaps we'll be hosting another

visit before long.



With great deli sandwiches and even better desserts, the postelection White House was the place to be following our November meet. Pete and Nancy White were gracious hosts as always and opened entirely their home to us. And what a home — it could easily pass as a museum — with Western memorabilia, antiques and toys including lead soldiers, boats, fire engines, and of course trains. They have devoted one bedroom to the operating train layout. Two loops of O gauge operate on a shelf encircling the room near the ceiling along with an operating, original monorail. The layout itself fills the room and closet with loops and sidings for running the standard gauge replicas of the classic old trains. Room was left for an operating auto race track, a working merry-go-round, a Toonerville Trolley line, and many operating circus accessories with lights and sounds, even fireworks. In the center is an original operating aeroplane. There is enough activity to delight any child, no matter the age. As always, it was a treat to visit their home, and we thank them for being so gracious.



"Great American Scenic Railroads"

QUESTAR QD3500




One thing that I have learned during the fifteen years that I have been a COSTCO member is that if you see something there you like, you'd better buy it immediately. Very often an item is no longer stocked when you go back to buy it.

I mention this only to warn you that this boxed set might not be available there any longer. But if it is, I highly recommend it. It features twelve hours of train video on six discs, priced at a paltry \$17.99.

The segments include "Continental Divide", Donner Summit", "The Surfline", "California Western", "The Blue Mountains", "Mt. Rainier", "Great Mississippi", "Shenandoah", "Durango & Silverton", "Cumbres & Toltec", "Rio Grande" and "Union Pacific". Sound and video quality are good although not exceptional. These are reissues of earlier Pentrex VHS tapes.

All six discs are packed in a hinged DVD Slim Pack album which takes up only as much shelf space as two ordinary DVD keepcases.

### Show and Tell

The theme of our September meeting was again RECENT FINDS, including the TTOS convention in Fresno. **Jerry Azzaro** brought in a small picture book. It was titled TIM AND HIS TOY TRAIN. It was published in 1949. It had some great period sketches. The original cost was fifteen cents. A nice boxed Schuco Disneyland monorail set was displayed by **Tom Gibson**. It was made from the middle fifties to the late sixties.

**Pete Keesling** shared pictures of his portable layout that he keeps in his old VW van. It is a two level layout with prewar Marx trains on the bottom and a mixture of lves and other trains on top. We hear that this layout is very much in demand. Pete likes to show his layout off to kids.

Jon Lundberg shared some items that he purchased on eBay. One item was a Lionel uncatalogued "Trolley Switch". He also had a "Strong Current" one gauge Marklin 4-4-2 locomotive and tender, and a clockwork one gauge Marklin 4-4-0 locomotive that needs a tender. This locomotive is very rare because the speed was controlled by the amount of air escaping from the cylinders.

Chuck Stone had a rare Lionel flag plot and two SUNOCO Standard gauge cars, one with brass trim and dome, and the other with nickel trim and dome. The car with brass trim is ten times rarer. A lithographed locomotive floor toy was brought in by Jim Groth. He also had a picture showing Clyde Easterly, Mark Boyd, and Karl Schmidt getting their longevity awards.

Mark Boyd showed a pair of Union Pacific Alco locomotives that he had repainted green to perfectly match his green "Lionel Lines" passenger cars from 1948. He also had strong reservations about security if the TTOS Directory was posted on the internet.

**Don Rosa** displayed a plaque that was awarded to him at the Fresno convention. Unfortunately, he was not able to be at the convention to receive the award personally.

I posted some pictures of the TTOS Fresno convention. I displayed: a Chad Valley UBILDA Locomotive that I picked up at Fresno, some Dollar Tree Christmas things for a layout, a Kibri news cart with period magazines, a Bing double cane piece, and a Schilling Airport Control Tower where the planes fly in different directions.

In October we did not have Show & Tell due to the Scottish Rite Meet.

In anticipation of a lot of business being conducted at the November meeting, I asked that every-body restrict their presentations. Everybody over-cooperated and we only had two presentations. **Jean** and **Meredith Hathaway** shared the catalog for the Ward Kimball Auction on November 19 and 20 (It is a shame that so many nice things will be going back to Germany). I presented a Doll Overhead Stationary Railroad Crane, like the one shown on page 92 of the Kimball Catalog. The only thing was that mine was missing the hoisting mechanism. 
