# What Happened in Las Vegas

The TTOS Las Vegas Convention was great! (at least for us). The only people I saw from our club were **Chuck Stone**, **Tom Gibson**, and **Clarence Hanks**. The weather was fine; in fact, it was cooler in Las Vegas than here.

We attended two of the tours:

- 1. The layout tour of three homes in the Las Vegas area. Two were in converted garage pads, and the third in a huge room. My favorite was the one who had professional help from a guy that does design for some of the casinos. It was unbelievable. It was almost four levels high, and he only had one switch. But, the detail work was something else. People, buildings, etc. were spectacular.
- 2. Pahrump tour of the winery, brothel, and one layout. This was a great tour. We all had a really nice time. (It was such a popular tour that both tours were sold out.)

We all were feeling pretty good by the time we left the winery. Here we have about 50 wineries in El Dorado County, and we bought a bottle of wine. The brothel was fascinating. We had a guided tour of the place. What was really interesting was that a question was brought up about what counties brothels could operate in, and the guide kind of was answering it, when **Richard Rauch**, who lives in Carson City, gave us the facts and figures of where they could operate. He worked for the state of Nevada.

The number of tables at show was approximately 60, but sold out, for the room size. **Carl** attended the auction both days and got some great bargains.

The general meeting Saturday morning was informative. I'll only cover the highlights, as it will be reported in detail, I'm sure, in one of the publications:



- Grading standards are going to be instituted (similar to TCA).
- 2. Treasurer gave report; basically club in black, but not by much.
- 3. Fresno Convention financially a major success.
- 4. **Stan Batynski** praised for work on brochures, boxcar design, helping office staff, answering questions, etc.
- 5. Stan Batynski resigned from National TTOS
- 6. Banquet instituted a Chinese raffle auction. Buy tickets, then place ticket in cup of item you are interested in, (you can put in all your tickets or one) then a drawing held.
- 7. **Mr. Keck** on Las Vegas convention:
  Barely made the room night commitment (TTOS owed approximately \$15,000 from the 2003 Convention).

Considering moving Pasadena office to another location, but by-laws will have to be changed as they state that the natl. office must be on Walnut St. in Pasadena. Will be a vote by all on Nov. ballot.

- 8. Membership directory will be on line. Passwords will be given with membership renewal. Will save club approx. \$15,000(?)
- Nominating committee for national office. No one opposed except for Treasurer (Smith vs Robinette) and Director at Large (Latta vs Young).



## Show and Tell By Richard Zanotti

The theme of our May meeting was, "Backdrops, plots, tunnels, etc.". Jon Lundberg presented some Built-Rite cardboard products, including buildings, backdrops, and a downtown city block. He even had a cardboard tunnel that was not practical, and as a result, is now extremely rare. Jerry Azzaro had some postwar American Flyer backdrops that when assembled properly give a three dimensional quality. He also had two A. F. tunnels. One was made of hard plastic and the other of Styrofoam. They seemed to be made from the same mold. Jerry also had a scenery product made by Life-Like. This paper product, when moistened, could be shaped into mountains and other things. Jerry also had some printed backdrops by Ideal Models and Life-Like. A Mike's Train House cardboard circus set was shared by Pete White. This set is a reproduction of the Ives circus set backdrop. Mark Boyd showed the Lionel tunnel portals that he bought with his paper route money in the 1950's. He also pointed out that Lionel was now marketing factory made layouts that sell for around \$5,745. Mark showed an article from a 1981 TCA QUARTERLY on tunnels that was written and illustrated by WUK (Ward Kimball). The article and illustrations were an amusing essay that was in some sense even irreverent. At least Ward never had to deal with the present FCC!

A collection of rare pristine tunnels was shared by Clyde Easterly. They included two early American Flyer papier mâché tunnels. One was decorated with sponge trees and the other had lights. He also had a beautiful paper mache Dorfan tunnel and two early papier mâché tunnels made by Ives. Chuck Stone displayed a beautiful 90 degree Lionel O gauge papier mâché tunnel made between 1932 and 1934. It was in mint condition and still in the original box.

The strangest coincidence then occurred: **Clarence Hanks** brought in the *same* rare Lionel tunnel. His was also in mint condition in its original box. This is the first time that two very rare items that were identical except for variations due to hand made production techniques were presented at the same Show & Tell.

Clarence also had some Lionel billboards from the 1950's-1960's and some American Flyer mountain panels that lock together. They are made in such

a way that trains can run in between them. He also had a standard gauge version of the 90 degree curved Lionel tunnel and a metal Lionel standard gauge tunnel with a light that he had recently purchased. Clarence also had some metal English village backdrops that he uses at Christmas.

We did not have Show & Tell at our June meet at Clipper Gap.

The theme of our July meet was patriotism. **Bill Bender** brought in a platter that commemorated the first Freedom Train. I remember seeing this train on the Marina Green in San Francisco in the late 1940's.

Chuck Brasher presented a red, white, and blue box car that he received at the TCA Convention in Seattle. The inscription on it, "K-Line Loves America", really struck a chord with Chuck. The fact that it was followed by the statement "Made in China" made a deep impression on him. The toy weapons storage rack that Jack Hornor shared would please any terrorist. It had bins labeled, "Atomic Bombs", "Rocket Parts", "Disintegrator" and "Launch Fuel". He also had a U.S. Air Force missile car and an Atomic Energy Commission railcar.

An HO model of the 1975 Freedom Train locomotive and tender were shared by **Chuck Stone**. I remember seeing that train in Detroit. I also saw it at Aquatic Park in San Francisco a few months later. By the time it arrived in San Francisco, the locomotive had been replaced.

**George Ann Hornor** had a G gauge car commemorating a fictitious Olympic salmon spawning event. The car has a salmon jumping up a cascade. On the sides of the car are signs showing the scores of judges from different countries: Germany 7.5, United States 7.0, and of course, France 10.5.

I brought in a Carlisle and Finch streetcar (#42). **George Hopkins** rebuilt the body on an original frame and motor. I also had a model of the Statue of Liberty. This statue was also pictured on some of the World War II advertisement that I brought. Naturally, the advertisements were very patriotic. I especially liked the advertisement from the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad. It featured a poem telling about trains moving at night and how they were uniting the nation in the great war effort (World War II).



## Show and Tell Gallery

The theme of our August Show & Tell was "Convention cars". John Smith brought in an O gauge Lionel tank car that was made for the 1973 TCA Convention at Pittsburgh. Jack Hornor presented a very rare O gauge Sacramento Northern box car made for the 1983 convention in Sacramento. Raymond Haas had a Lionel Junior 1588 steam engine and tender that was originally a mechanical set. It had been converted to electric by Madison Hardware. This set was pulling a set of 1700 passenger cars.

John Leins shared many O gauge lithoed tin convention items. He had a forty-ninth (2003) convention Southern Pacific refrigerator car and a Northwestern 1993 convention livestock car. He also had a TTOS convention combination car called "Portland" for the convention being held there. Two other cars, locomotive and tender in Southern Pacific livery were also made for this set at a later date. John also had a O gauge QUEENS CAFE DINER that was made for the 2003 TTOS convention.

I shared some McCoy standard gauge convention cars. I had a very rare 1966 Santa Monica TCA convention car. It was so early that it had unstamped trucks (Margaret McCoy told me that at the time these cars were made they could not afford to buy the tools to punch out the trucks). The 1973 TCA convention car for the Dearborn Convention was a four window kitchen car. I also had a twentieth TCA convention car that was made for the 1974 convention at Seattle. This car was similar to the Dearborn kitchen car. The difference being that it had only two windows and was called a supply car. I also presented some pictures of Don Spencer's McCoy collection and Dave Dansky's eclectic collection. Don Spencer probably has the most complete McCoy collection that could be found.

Dave Dansky has a little of everything in his collection. If he likes it, he has it.

I also talked about everybody participating in Show & Tell. This is the only way that that we can keep it from becoming the exclusive domain of a few people like myself. Don't count on the other guy bringing in something to share. YOU ALSO HAVE TO SHARE TO KEEP SHOW & TELL ALIVE AND WELL.

## **Club Layout News**

SVD acquired a 6 x 10 ft. box trailer and outfitted it to store and transport our club layout. Prior to this, our layout was stored in a garage and even a simple one day presentation (such as at our monthly meet) required four handlings of the layout. This process was hard on the layout and the volunteers. With the "bookshelf" design of the trailer, it is possible to access only the layout sections needed for the setup without disturbing the others. The sections ride in a framework of PVC piping, and glide in and out on protective carpeting.

Lee Deter drafted the design for the framework while Paul Wells laid the tile on the floor. They then got together and spent approximately 40 hours of time putting the inner frame together and installing the padding to hold the layout.

This makes loading and unloading the layout so much easier than doing everything twice. Also we don't have to unload all the sections just to set up anything smaller than the whole layout. It will also save wear and tear on the layout, let alone the fact that it has its own storage. No more garage storage or stowing in the back of Norman's truck, which has been retired after many, many years of service.

A special thanks to **Kit and Rose Craighead** for donating the tile for the floor, **Phil Fravesi** for some of the PVC pipe for the frame and **Mike Boyd** for the carpet used for padding.

Also we cannot forget **Norman LaClair ("The Man")** who made all this happen. Without him this marvelous tool for keeping the "O" in TTOS would probably be stuck in a garage somewhere, and would not bring any smiles to thousands of faces. Thanks, Norman.

And a special thank to all the members for your support in getting the trailer so the Sacramento Valley Division of TTOS can support "The World's Greatest Hobby."


