Carl Boyer, one of our early members, passed away in March. I, along with many others, will always remember him fondly. Wearing an engineer's cap and a big smile, Carl came to almost every meeting, but often when everyone else was packing up to leave. He loved his

standard gauge trains, but he had other interests, too. He loved to tell stories of his days as a child radio actor on "Jack Armstrong, All American Boy." He played pro-baseball for the Cardinals before his career was interrupted by World War II. After the war, he was head baseball and basketball coach at UC Davis and Sacramento City College in the 1950's. He went on to be the Director of Parks and Recreation in North Sacramento where he served as Commissioner of ASA softball for over 30 years. In recognition of his exceptional service, Redwood Park was re-named "Carl E. Boyer" field.

### Show and Tell By Richard Zanotti

The theme of our March meeting, "The Ives of March", was suggested by **Jack Ahearn**. **John DeHaan** brought a nice Ives "Gray Ghost" set. He also brought an old Ives station with lithoed interior and a #115 station with light. **Pete Keesling** shared a maroon Ives standard gauge passenger set in beautiful condition. The most interesting part was that it was wrapped in the original 1926 Chicago newspaper. I displayed pictures from the 1928 Ives catalog (the year Ives went bankrupt.) These included the Ives three-position remote reverse so coveted by Lionel, the Standard Gauge die-cast steam locomotive so coveted by American Flyer and prototype 19-inch passenger cars which were never produced. I also displayed a 100-year-old Märklin station beautifully restored by **Ira Keeler**.

Rick Wilson suggested that since our meeting fell on April Fool's Day our Show and Tell theme should be "The Train That Fooled You". Jack Hornor brought a Marx "William Crooks" locomotive. He said that it started smoking the first Then he learned that it came with a smoke unit. Chuck Stone showed a time he ran it, so he quickly stopped it. Lionel #50 gang car. He later discovered that it had been made from a #69 maintenance car. Chuck also displayed a "very rare" Flyer Wide Gauge searchlight car. Flyer never made such a car, this one was nicely converted from a flat car. Jim Groth brought an O-Gauge prewar Flyer cattle car which he made from a Flyer boxcar. Jim also had a Flyer Wide Gauge searchlight car which he converted from a flat car. Jim showed us his Flyer #3045 crane car, made from a cast crane assembly he purchased and had finished by Ira Keeler. New member Jim Peroutka brought two Lionel passenger cars purchased on eBay. He was disappointed to find that they were not "excellent" as represented by the seller; in fact they had some reproduction parts. Paul Wells brought a trolley he purchased at the Cal-Stewart auction. He thought it was a 2-rail model but was delighted to find after buying it that it was 3-rail. Jerry Azzaro showed his 1947 Christmas gift— a Lionel steam freight set— and the diesel streamline passenger set his mother bought for him in 1951. Not knowing the difference, mom had in fact purchased a Flyer "Silver Streak" set. This eventually put Jerry on the path to being a Flyer aficionado. I told about the roofless station I purchased at one of our meets many years ago. I thought that it was Lionel, but Karl Schmidt said that it was not. He guessed that it was Märklin, and after much research I confirmed that he was correct. I also showed photos a station I purchased at York. I originally thought it to be Märklin but later found it in a 1931 Karl Bub catalog.

In June we will have our picnic at the Rio Vista Junction museum. In July we need to allow time for everyone to get to the Grass Valley layout visits. So, no Show and Tell until the August SVD meeting.

CONFESSIONS OF AN EBAY MISCREANT



# HOME LAYOUT TOURS



Layout visits - how good can they get? We've seen two outstanding O-gauge layouts, and now we have more to come. In June, of course, we travel to the Western Railway Museum at Rio Vista Junction. And the July 1<sup>st</sup> home layout tour will be really special. **Chuck Brasher, Clyde Easterly** and **Chuck Stone** all have layouts that are known and admired by collectors and operators from all over the country, and we're fortunate to have them as members of our division. You may have seen videos or magazine articles featuring one or all of them. Chuck Brasher collects and operates pristine standard gauge trains, all made before 1939; Clyde has standard and O-gauge trains, but maybe his pride and joy is his No. 1 gauge operating layout; Chuck Stone again has standard and O, but the display of his Ives collection steals the show there. The Brashers and Easterlys live in Grass Valley, and the Stones are in nearby Penn Valley. We had originally scheduled two visits on successive months, but because of the price of gasoline, we decided to combine them. The three visits will make for a fairly long day, so we hope to start the meeting on July 1 a little early and skip the Show and Tell. Instead of everyone beginning at one home and moving as a group between homes, we suggest you start at any of the three homes and proceed from there at your own pace. Because it will be difficult to plan the number of guests at each home at any given time, the hosts will not be serving lunch, so please make your plans accordingly. Maps will, of course, be available. Don't miss this one, and plan to spend the day.

We will skip August because it's just before the TTOS National Convention in Costa Mesa. In September, **Mike De la Pena** has invited us to his home in Shingle Springs. Mike has been in TTOS for several years, but he's new to our division. Skipping October for the River City Train Show, we re-visit the "**White** house" in November.

The layout uses conventional operation on old-style Lionel O-gauge track. There are several loops for multiple train operation using old ZW transformers. Almost every accessory, from postwar to modern, is featured and they all operate. The exciting operation of the three-level railroad empire is enhanced by the structures and imaginative scenery that Phil designed and created. Typical of the clever scenes you will notice is the truck driver dumping drums of waste over the side of a canyon. Not a good practice, I'll admit, but fun to look at. As usual at the **Fravesi** home, we had a great lunch. Phil's culinary skills are well known around train people, and his chili proved the point. Thank you, **Phil** and **Emma**.

How can we thank the **Busicks** enough for the wonderful layout tour, lunch, and afternoon together? Everyone had their fill of a great lunch with lemonade made with lemons from the tree which partially shaded us while we visited about trains. The heart of their layout is an original Lionel Classic Super-O Dealer display layout from the 60's. Surrounding this is a great beginning of a 16' x 17 ½' modern, multi-loop Ross track and switches layout. **Dean** had both layouts operating superbly with TMCC on the modern layout and conventional Lionel transformers on the dealer layout. There was something for everyone – the dealer layout with original accessories for the postwar fans and the new layout for modern operators. The train room was specifically built for the trains and the decor includes plenty of shelves for displaying their collection.
