2006 TTOS Convention Report

Several Sacramento Valley Division members attended the Costa Mesa convention during the third week of August. In spite of the fact that the convention was moved up a year, the Southern Pacific Division did an excellent job of preparation and came up with activities to please everyone. Free gifts are always popular, and along with a California billboard insert and souvenir replica of a Santa Ana and Newport Railway Company Pass, each registrant was given an attractive tote bag commemorating TTOS's 40th anniversary. The tours were well received, and the banquet was very nice. Those of us on the Knott's Berry Farm tour were treated to a private tour of the narrow gauge locomotives and rolling stock that Walter Knott acquired after the Denver and Rio Grande stopped narrow gauge operations. Everything, including a Galloping Goose, is beautifully restored and in operating condition. I appreciated the fact that the SP Division made sure that wheelchairs could be accommodated. The electric lift to the gondola was as good as any "E Ticket" ride.

Although the attendance was down somewhat, there were lots of trains to buy. The star of the show may have been the Ives Standard Gauge National Limited, made only in 1930, and in the original boxes—including the set box. It wasn't for sale, though. The proud owner had recently purchased it back East after looking for it for more than 30 years, and he brought it in for the other standard gauge collectors to see. **Chuck Brasher** can tell you more about it, including the price. Wow.

Next year, it's on to Altoona and Horseshoe Curve.



Show and Tell By Richard Zanotti

Bill Wilson suggested that we have KITS AND KIT BASHING as a theme for our May Show & Tell. Unfortunately, Bill was not able to participate due to an automobile accident.

Gene Hathaway presented several items. They were: a crane boom car made from a Lionel work caboose, a very long cattle car made by combining two smaller cattle cars, a WWI cannon car made by attaching a Lionel #10 cannon car to a flat car, a double stack container car, and an aircraft parts car.

Bill Bender showed some of his projects. They included: a Southern Pacific water car like the ones at the Roseville yards that are used to fight fires, a Southern Pacific operating rotary snow plow, a Santa Fe box car with a flashing rear light, a Santa Fe #3465 Hudson locomotive with 84 inch drive wheels. Bill had to build a matching tender from scratch.

Frank Jablonski shared a turbo-locomotive that he rebuilt, installing a QSI electronic E unit and a LGB smoke unit. Karl Schmidt showed a Kibri station that he restored. He had to do research in order to find out what the station originally looked like. He had to build a roof from scratch. He did such a good job that it is hard to tell that the roof was made of wood instead of metal.

John Liens had a HO Maryland and Chelsea Railroad #14 combination car that was made from scratch.

Clyde Easterly brought in a prekit-bashing one gauge Ives #3239 locomotive that had been modified in ancient times and was in pieces. Wallace Ripley said that he thinks that he can restore it and get it running. I will let you know what happens.

Jim Groth took the opportunity to show his kit-bashed standard gauge American Flyer searchlight car that American Flyer never made. He made it from an assortment of Flyer and Lionel parts. He also displayed and gave away photographs of our visit to **Phil Fravesi's** layout the month before.

I shared a circa 1910, Marklin station with etched glass windows, the only problem was that it did not have a roof. I also had a Karl Bubb station combination made up of a passenger station, a refreshment patio, and a freight station. The only problem was that the freight station did not have a roof. I used a color copy machine to copy the passenger station roof and reduce it so that it would fit the freight station. I also enlarged that same passenger station roof so that it would fit the Marklin station.

Many years ago **Jack Ahearn** suggested to me that I use a color copy machine to replace the missing side of a lithoed Lionel station. It worked. I think we will see a lot more of this in the future.

We did not have Show & Tell at either our June or July meetings. In June we went to the Western Railway Museum at Rio Vista Junction. In July we visited the layouts at Grass Valley.

George Ann Hornor suggested that we repeat CONVENTION AND COMMEMORATIVE CARS as a theme for Show & Tell at our August meet. She shared a TTOS Sacramento convention car that was part of a centerpiece put together by **Don Rosa** for the convention banquet. Don made about forty of these center pieces. George Ann also had some very rare HO convention cars.

Tom Gibson designed the prototype for the TTOS 1984 Sacramento Convention car that was presented by **Jack Hornor.** It had a logo displaying the state capitol.

Chuck Stone shared a TCA Twenty-fifth Silver Anniversary car from the 1979 convention. This car came with a silver medallion. Usually this medallion is missing.

Jim Groth shared an article about **Chuck Brasher** in a TCA QUARTERLY from the early 1970's. The article was written by Chuck's wife, **Sue**.

Bill Wilson presented the book, <u>THE MAN WHO LOVED TRAINS</u>. **Jeff Silvera** told us about the book that he is reading, SACRAMENTO STREETCARS.

I displayed a Karl Bubb track crossing from the 1920's. When the switch on the track is tripped, a clockwork motor: rings a bell, activates the crossing gates, and moves semaphore arms.

I also presented an elaborate crossing made by Carette, about 1905. On this crossing a bell rings, the crossing gates go up and down, and the semaphore arms move when you pull a trip. This hundred-year-old piece had just been restored by **Ira Keeler**.

Greetings from the TTOS Track Shops. We are going to start a project on the layout by replacing the S gauge track with GarGraves 36" track sections. This will reduce the number of junctions and will help reduce the trains slowing down because of rust on the track pins and track joints. By using GarGraves track, we will be able to set up the curves without them being abrupt and causing the cars and locomotives to derail. By the way, this track has wood ties, making it look more realistic. After a great amount of investigation and looking at the track on our layout, we were really surprised to see the amount of rust on the S gauge track in the joints. Therefore the only solution we have found is to replace this track to help stop the problem of the S gauge trains slowing down and speeding up in various places. We are looking forward to having the repairs made in time for the October 7th Scottish Rite Show.

The remaining public shows this year are the October 7 show at the Scottish Rite Temple and everybody's favorite show, the Railroad Museum show on November 24, 25, and 26 (the Friday, Saturday and Sunday following Thanksgiving). I have read several articles in "O Gauge Railroading" and "Classic Toy Trains" and the articles stated that the national traveling shows were being closed or sold. I called the national show that comes to the Cow Palace in San Francisco, Pleasanton, Santa Rosa and Sacramento and was told that the Great Train Expo, which is the company that was at Cal Expo last January, will be here again in January 2007 and is not being sold or going out of business. So we will still have a nationwide train show coming to Sacramento, Santa Rosa, San Francisco, and Pleasanton for two day shows.

Let's keep our trains running and support the public shows with our layout.






















HOME LAYOUT TOURS
