CSRM is hosting reservation-only tours for members on June 15 of the "new" historic SP locomotive shops in Sacramento. If you aren't a member, you should be!

Yours truly spent the weekend of April 10-11 in Willits, attending the annual Steam Engineering and Operations Safety Class at the Roots of Motive Power. It was two very full days of classroom AND operating sessions. There were 26 attendees and we got to fire and operate: a stationary steam logging "donkey" engine, a Buffalo-Springfield steam roller (ca. 1905) and an Ohio loco crane (self-propelled 30 ton crane (a. 1915 predecessor to the Burro crane). We all got cab rides in

the Mason County Logging 2-6-2T loco (but not drive it). That loco is celebrating its 100th birthday this month! This class is open only to RoMP members (at \$35/year) and costs \$75. They also offer a two-day railroad operations and safety course for the same cost. I hope to take that this year. Plan to attend the big annual steam festival there this year September 11-12. Everything (steam) that is operational will be running! From small engines to huge steam shovels.



HOME LAYOUT TOURS

On March 6, we traveled to El Dorado Hills to see the **Basile** layout. Many wives I know would love to have this setup – a hobby that involves her entire family and which can be moved out of the way when not in use. This layout is truly spectacular with its clever design and exquisite modeling. Located in a three-car garage, the multilayered, high-rail layout is built on a sixteen by eighteen steel table with legs on rollers. When in use, it is possible to walk completely around the table. When not in use, the entire layout can easily be covered and pushed aside so that two cars can be accommodated in the same garage.

In his state-of-the-art layout, **Tony** has used Atlas track with some Ross switches. It is powered by a Lionel ZW and an MTH 4000. Every engine is either a Lionel Legacy/TMCC or Mike's Train House DCS - PS2, and each has cruise control (also known as Engineer on Board). There are four continuous, independent loops, although ones on the same level are interconnected. The largest curves are 81 inches, with none smaller than 63 inches in diameter and the track is ballasted where visible. It is possible to work on all four sides of the layout, as well as in the center through removable access holes hidden in the scenery.

Those of us who attend monthly club meetings and train shows are familiar with **Gaetano's** artistic skill, and that afternoon we found that it's definitely a family trait. As we admired the superbly modeled buildings and industrial areas with the many wonderful little scenes, we found that it is indeed a family project. Tony was quick to point out that Nancy is always involved, as of course are **Gaetano** and **Amanda**. Tony's daughter, **Candi**, designed Grand Central Station, the centerpiece of the layout. At first glance, the layout is amazing, but as you look at the many activities with people, cars, bicycles ... and on and on. Even the insides of the tunnels were finished and lighted. Oh, there were trains, too, and an awesome crane.

To top it off, we were served a delicious lunch. We certainly thank **Tony** and **Nancy** for a great afternoon. Wow.



"Well, you didn't ask for it, but I can't stand to see perfectly good electrons just go to waste, so I'm sending these pictures of a couple of model railroad layouts we toured Saturday.

"The first layout was **Jack and George Ann Hornor's**, over in Galt. They hosted an open house on Saturday for members of their model railroad club, but we got there a little late. No problem ... Jack fired it all up for us and George Ann had more stuff set out for snacks than we could deal with. Both of them are enthusiasts, and apparently, it's their main madness ... the whole house was filled with train stuff. First thing that greeted you when you walked into the house was the giant layout, which took up the whole living room. Jack is a retired nuclear engineer, so there were little nuclear things all over the layout. Amongst other things, he had a couple of operating nuclear reactors ... one by Lionel, and the other, a vintage tin plate item made by Marx back in the fifties. There were funny little nudges everywhere you looked ... a favorite was a take off on the 'OI Honest John's Used Cars, except this was a sales lot full of outhouses and a sales office with the sign "Honest Karr's Used Johns." "On the way home, we detoured by way of Woodland to see another train guy – **Dave Thomsen**. 
Jack Hornor conducted the April Show and Tell with the following notes.

Jerry Azzaro had seen it on her layout and asked why it was spelled "Dinor" instead of Diner. John Liens brought an old TCA quarterly with the explanation. Early on, Marx had their manufacturing facility in Girard, PA, and it was the local custom around Erie and Girard to use that spelling, so Marx followed the prototype.



Watch the crew of the other train bail out just before they get hit! This is a crew's worst nightmare, besides the close calls at the crossings. Watch the signals for the train that was suppose to take the siding. The train that appears to be standing still on the mainline was not standing still.

The engineer either failed to stop in the clear and was still moving forward or after he stopped, he may have mistakenly released his brakes and some slack rolled out of the train and pushed his locomotive forward. At any rate, that did not happen until the other train was within a few feet of the signal - that is why you see the signal drop double red just as they go by it.

The approaching train crew had absolutely no warning that the other train had fouled the siding.
