### President's Message

What a summer it's been for the Sacramento Valley Division! We had a great day at the Western Railway Museum to kick it off and now we are heading for a double-header in September – Speeder Rides in Shingle Springs and Railfest in Folsom, with an open house at **Don Rosa's** in-between! If you didn't make the reservation list for speeders, come on up on the 27th anyway! **Ed Strisar** will have details at the September 6th meeting.

The Buffalo Convention was terrific! The Niagara Frontier Division put together an unforgettable line-up of events. A tour of the GM Tonawanda engine assembly plant and the Pierce-Arrow Museum, a steam train ride on the Arcade & Attica line, Erie Canal locks tour on a paddle-wheeler in Lockport, great layout tours, a first-rate welcome party at the hotel and then an "open house" visit to the Navy ships at the Lake Erie waterfront. We had an ice cream social on the fantail of the USS Little Rock (a heavy missile cruiser), and time to explore the USS The Sullivans, a WWII destroyer, and USS Croaker, a WWII submarine.

There was a substantial turnout for the trading hall and several silent auctions that helped deplete a couple of checking accounts.

There was a National Board meeting, so **Tom Gibson**, **Phil Fravesi**, and I attended in person. The National TTOS is doing very well thanks to the generous volunteering by **Jim Selvius**, **Rick Plummer**, **J Keeley**, and others. We have a new webmaster and Bulletin editor (who re-issued a plea for more articles and photos from all members), a new accountant, and a new CPA. President **Randy Giroux** is doing a good job in moving National towards better things on many fronts. **Dave Otth** will provide contact info on the SW Division members and Randy will contact them directly to see if they want

to rejoin National as part of a newly realigned division map of Southern California (despite the insistence of Larry Pearson who says SWD people do not want any part of National). The big news is that the revised bylaws for National were passed at the Board meeting for voting by the membership. (New bylaws are a necessary step toward tax-exempt status for National.) The big change to the bylaws is the provision of two membersat-large ... one for the East (of the Mississippi) and one for the West. The growth of eastern membership makes the provision of a member-at-large a really sound idea. Thanks to the great planning by J Keeley and Jim Strom, the convention was in the black with all hotel minima met. (It was a really nice hotel with a great staff, too!)

There was a pretty good attendance at the convention (200 or so) but there was not a quorum at the membership meeting, so the by-laws have to be voted on by the entire membership via a mail ballot. Randy introduced the new Board members and plans were announced for the 2015 National Convention in Albuquerque. Lots of things to see and do there but the big feature may well be a two-day pre-convention tour to include runs on the Cumbre & Toltec and the Durango & Silverton lines! Sign me up now!

The 2016 convention (50th anniversary) will be in LA, maybe on the Queen Mary! The 2017 event is being planned for "back East" – Cleveland has been suggested.

Our own "Big Event" (Scottish Rite) is just weeks away and table reservations are being taken now. See Beverly for forms. Please note that YOUR entire Board is up for election in November. Ed Strisar has volunteered to run for VP, but we have NO nominees for President, Secretary, or Treasurer and your incumbents are NOT running again! So help your club move ahead and stand for election! None of the jobs are terribly demanding and your skills are needed to keep the fun coming!


TTOS – SVD Meeting Minutes – 8-02-2014

While preparing for this story in the C.S.R.M. research library, I inadvertently came across this one-of-a-kind greeting. I was leafing through old issues of the 'HOBO NEWS', when out of the decade old pages, a loose sheet fell to the floor. I had been hoping to find examples of the colorful names and scrolled signatures that hobos quickly chalked onto freight cars. As I retrieved it from the floor, my eyes quickly absorbed its mother-lode content. It revealed not only a thoughtful holiday greeting, signed by the papers staff to CSRM's chief librarian, but also the very type of signatures and images I was hoping to find. *Wow; wad a nice kinda guys doze there hobos' wuz!* 



## Westbound

The Hobo Memorial Cemetery is where our brother hobos go to rest after catching the Westbound



Hobos have a language all their own. It's colorful, and in many of their sayings are tones of pathos and irony, and some humor is expressed. Those sentiments can be heard in the following exchange:

"Hey Bo...Ya been seeing 'ol Tex around anywhere"?

"Naw, he won't be 'round any more. He took the Westbound"!

This poignant reference to a westbound train is a hobo's way of saying one of theirs died. Or more likely, met his or her death while hopping or falling from a freight train. Either way, it was their final moments as they headed into the western sunset.

#### He Caught the Westbound

Many years ago, when I wouldn't dare leave home without a comb, I knew a frisky little guy nicknamed "Leprechaun". Johnny was his given name but his moniker fit him better. He was a little guy, barely topping sixty inches and his weight hardly doubled that. Yeah, you're right, he was (key word was) a jockey. But that was quite a few years earlier from when I knew him. When I met and became acquainted with the lovable little rascal, he could better, or for worse, be described in racing world terms as a, 'stable bum'. But damn it, to me the Lep wasn't a bum...he just took a few wrong turns, on and off, the track.

Realizing there would be little point in debating the issue, I slapped him on the back and wished him luck.

"Give 'em hell, ya lttle 'ol Lephrechaun!"
"See ya 'round, Jack."

A few days later word was out that he hopped a freight. The Houston Chronicle had a short item telling of a hobo's body being found severed along the tracks. Apparently, as a result of falling from a freight train headed toward Los Angeles. The poor dumb 'Bo' was aiming for Kentucky on a train traveling west from Houston, Texas. Truly, my friend; "Caught the Westbound."
